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MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF



DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

The organizational structure of this department is designed to create an efficient means to accomplish our mission and goals and to provide for the best possible service to the public. The Chief of Police is responsible for administrating and managing the Lincoln City Police Department. There are four sections in the Police Department as follows:

Administration Division

The Administration Division is commanded by the Administrative Lieutenant whose primary responsibility is to provide general management, direction and control for the Code Enforcement Officer and the Community Service Officer. The Administration Division consists of the Evidence Property Room, Records Center, Code Enforcement and Community Service Officer.

Patrol Division

The Patrol Division is commanded by the Operations Lieutenant whose primary responsibility is to provide general management, direction and control for that Division. The Patrol Division consists of Uniformed Patrol, and School Resource Officer.

Investigations Division

The Investigation Division is commanded by the Operations Lieutenant whose primarily responsibility is to provide general management and direction to the Detective Sergeant.

911 Telecommunications Division

The Telecommunications Division is commanded by the 911 Operations Manager whose primary responsibility is to provide general management, direction and training for the 911 Center staff, along with coordination of the 911 Center's contracted services with North Lincoln Fire and Rescue, Newport Police Department for Law Enforcement Data Services and Radio support for Toledo Police Department's 911 Center.



PUBLIC INFORMATION OFFICERS

The primary job of the LCPD public information officer is to facilitate communication between the organization and the public. The PIO acts as a liaison and contact point between the department and media to provide them with timely and essential information regarding events or incidents that involve the police department. In addition, the PIO works in an ambassador role for the department by interacting with the citizens, the media, and community organizations to promote positive community relations and information sharing. Those wanting to receive up-to-date information regarding events involving the Lincoln City Police Department are encouraged to follow the department's Facebook page and subscribe to FlashAlert.

The PIO also serves as a Strategic Communications Advisor to the Chief of Police by:

- Anticipating opportunities to tell the department's story through proactive, positive media and curated content
- Supporting the Chief's mission and vision through communication
- Curating, protecting, and amplifying the agency's brand
- Working proactively in crises to build transparent communications
- Creating a community of advocates via engagement strategies

RECORDS DEPARTMENT



Lincoln City Police Department's Records Division is staffed by a dedicated Administrative Assistant and a dual Admin Assistant/Evidence Support Specialist. They are responsible for maintaining the accuracy, integrity, and confidentiality of sensitive information pertaining to the Police Department. Their duties include processing all police reports, which are distributed to local courts, DAs, and other agencies. Other responsibilities are data entry, facilitating Sex Offender registrations, completing requests for records checks/police reports from other agencies, as well as requests from the public, monitoring court schedules, distributing subpoenas, and performing background investigation requests. Tami Williams has been with the Lincoln City Police Department for 16 years. In 2008, she was hired as a 911 Dispatcher and spent her first 7 years in that capacity, before becoming the Records Administrator in 2015. She is also the Coordinator for our Citizens Police Academy, the spearhead for generating department involvement in community events, and the official proofreader for LCPD. Kambra Buell joined LCPD in November 2023. She previously spent 6 years in the hospitality industry, and 10 years as an educator.

In 2024 the records division processed:

- **1901 police reports**
- **708 follow-up reports**
- **950 records requests**
- **61 sex offender registrations**

PROPERTY AND EVIDENCE

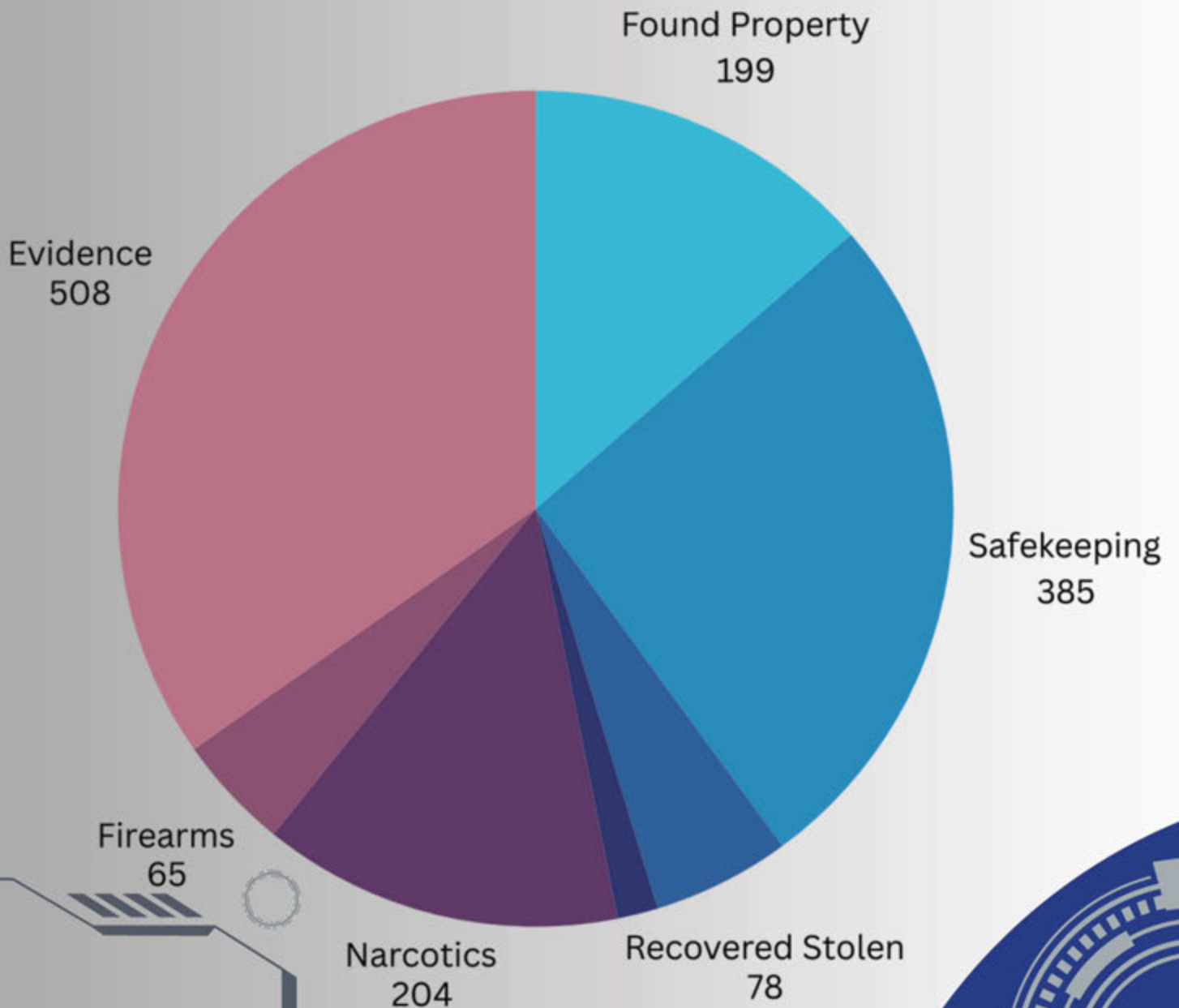
Our Property & Evidence Technician assists the agency by ensuring that all submitted property items are packaged, cataloged, and stored properly, and also assists the Records Division as needed. The Evidence Technician must exercise the utmost care in the accounting, control, and integrity of all property that comes into our custody. The Evidence Technician must care for seized property to retain its evidentiary value, and ensure the protection of property from contamination or deterioration. The Evidence Technician facilitates the transfer of property to and from the lab and the courts, and maintains all documentation of its movement, while adhering to all State and Federal laws, Lincoln City Police policies, District Attorney policies, and City of Lincoln City policies.

Mara Young has been an Evidence Technician with the Lincoln City Police Department for 6 years. In addition to managing the Evidence Room, she assists at crime scenes and search warrants. To date, she has helped with 10 search warrants, 7 crime scenes, and has assisted the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office with 1 of their search warrants, as well as worked as an analyst during child luring operations.

CODE ENFORCEMENT



The Code Enforcement Officer conducts investigations and gathers pertinent information to determine compliance with the Lincoln City Municipal Code, takes enforcement actions, and informs the general public regarding the Municipal Code.

They conduct periodic patrols and respond to Municipal Code violations as assigned, which includes researching, interpreting and applying Municipal Code to specific conduct and situations and conducting investigations and inspections. The Code Enforcement Officer works with members of the public to bring violations into compliance, with the primary strategy being voluntary compliance.

Code Enforcement Officer Craig Grabenhorst is tasked with proactively enforcing Lincoln City's municipal codes and laws. Officer Grabenhorst spent over 25 years as a Police Officer for the LCPD before retiring. Officer Grabenhorst returned to the LCPD in 2017 to fill the open Code Enforcement position and has excelled ever since.

In 2024, There were **238** code enforcement complaints that were investigated. Of those cases, **226** were closed and completed with **177** being voluntarily resolved (no enforcement action other than contact and advisement of the violation) and **21** cases were forced closed (warning letters issued, citation issued, other enforcement action taken). As an example, readers will see in the chart that in 2024, there were **111** Prohibited Vehicle Storage/Abandoned Vehicle cases, and of those, the Code Enforcement Officer was required to tow **28** vehicles (**2** of which were RVs), as the owners did not take care of the issue.

COMMUNITY SERVICE OFFICER

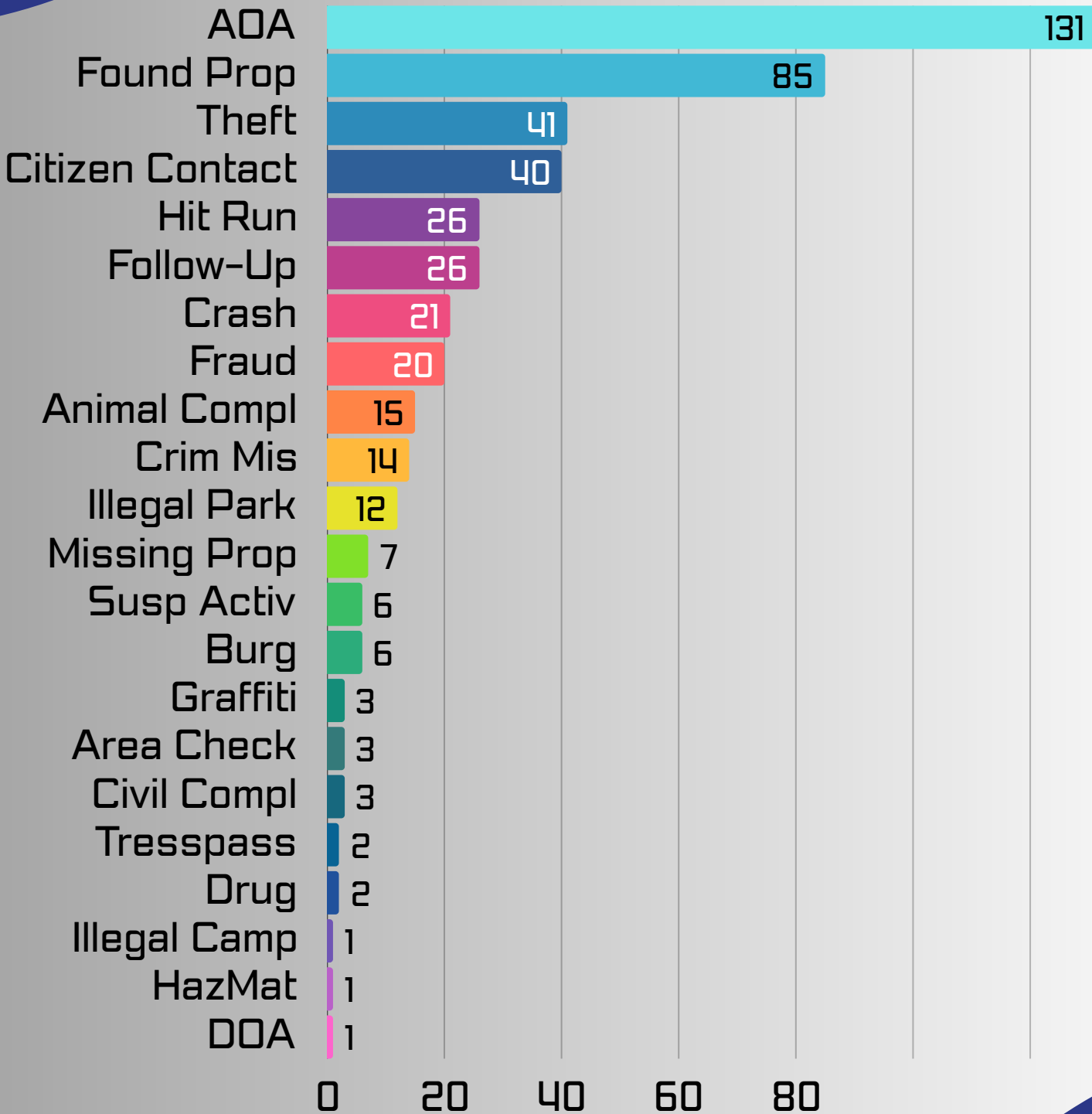
Our Community Service Officer (CSO) Jim Folmar performs a wide range of duties in support of departmental operations, particularly incidents that do not require a sworn police officer. These incidents include minor traffic crash investigations, minor criminal investigations, parking enforcement, traffic control, found property investigations, evidence collection, and subpoena service duties. In addition, our CSO is involved in community engagement at outreach activities, as well as crime prevention and security at special events and school events. Since the CSO is a non-sworn position, he wears a different uniform, drives a different vehicle, and carries non-lethal weapons such as a Taser, rather than a firearm; these differences allow the public to distinguish the CSO from a sworn police officer.

2024 was the first full year of the department's CSO program. CSO Folmar handled a substantial number of calls for service and completed a significant number of reports and subpoena services, which allowed our sworn patrol officers more time to focus on criminal investigations and proactive patrol efforts.

COMMUNITY SERVICE OFFICER



PATROL DIVISION



Patrol officers are the backbone of every police department; they respond to calls in the community 24 hours per day. Patrol officers respond to 9-1-1 and non-emergency calls for service, and are available around the clock, every day of the year. They are assigned to two shifts: day (6 AM – 6 PM), and graveyard (6 PM – 6 AM). When there are no community-generated calls, officers proactively patrol neighborhoods, enforce traffic safety laws, address chronic issues in the city and follow up on felony and misdemeanor cases. Most people are surprised to learn that, on average, there are only 3 patrol officers on duty in Lincoln City at any given time. The department's goal is to eventually staff 4 officers at all times. This model provides the fastest emergency response possible and ensures all areas of the city receive visible service, to help reduce crime and the fear of crime. This model also allows an individual officer to become a regular fixture in a given community, enhancing the opportunities to meet neighbors, develop ongoing relationships, offer crime prevention advice and understand the unique concerns in a specific Lincoln City area.



PATROL DIVISION - CONT.

Lincoln City patrol officers also have the opportunity to join other officers and deputies from agencies throughout Lincoln County on specialized, interagency teams that serve this area. One **(1)** patrol officer participates in the Lincoln County Tactical Response Team (TRT), which is a highly-skilled and well-equipped tactical unit that responds to extremely hazardous situations where conventional police tactics and equipment may be inadequate. TRT assists police departments across the county with high-risk calls, including hostage situations and armed subjects.

One **(1)** patrol officer participates in the Lincoln County Crisis Negotiation Unit (CNU), an interagency team that works to bring peaceful resolutions to volatile situations, which may include a hostage situation, a subject barricaded in a building or other police emergencies. CNU members are trained in crisis negotiation and use those skills to bring about the safest resolution possible. One **(1)** patrol sergeant has been instrumental in setting up the LCPD Drone Team. Two **(2)** patrol officers serve as K-9 handlers on our K-9 team. Read more about their work on our K-9 program page.

Two **(2)** patrol sergeants are certified as Drug Recognition Evaluators (DRE). These officers have specialized training to recognize impairment in drivers under the influence of drugs other than, or in addition to alcohol.

One **(1)** patrol sergeant is also certified and participates on the Lincoln County Crash Team. This specialized team has special training on reconstructing crashes and uncovering critical details to support crime investigations that often involve fatal or serious injury collisions with a criminal element.



TO CATCH A PREDATOR

LCPD Officers conducted many child sex luring operations this year. Undercover officers posed as children on social media platforms in an effort to catch predators seeking sexual acts from children. Predators who tried to meet up with who they believed were children were instead arrested by LCPD Officers.

LCPD INVESTIGATIONS LEAD TO LIFE SENTENCES WITHOUT PAROLE

On Thursday, December 19, 2024, 31-year-old Ryan R.L. Braddock of Lincoln City was sentenced to life in prison without parole in relation to two Lincoln City Police Department investigations.

Braddock was arrested on August 21, 2023, on two counts of Luring a Minor and two counts of Online Sexual Corruption of a Child in the Second Degree. After a multi-day hearing, jurors of Lincoln County found Braddock guilty of all four counts.

On Wednesday, May 29, 2024, 28-year-old Joseph R. Williams of Toledo was sentenced to life in prison without parole in relation to a Lincoln City Police Department investigation.

Williams was arrested on November 13, 2023, on charges of Luring a Minor, Online Sexual Corruption of a Minor in the First Degree, Attempted Rape in the Third Degree, Attempted Sodomy in the Third Degree, and Attempted Sex Abuse in the Third Degree. After a multi-day hearing, jurors of Lincoln County found Williams guilty on both charges brought to trial: Luring a Minor and Online Sexual Corruption of a Minor in the First Degree.

Due to Braddock's and Williams' previous convictions on child sex-related crimes, they were both sentenced to Life in Prison without Parole by Judge Amanda Benjamin of the Lincoln County Circuit Court.

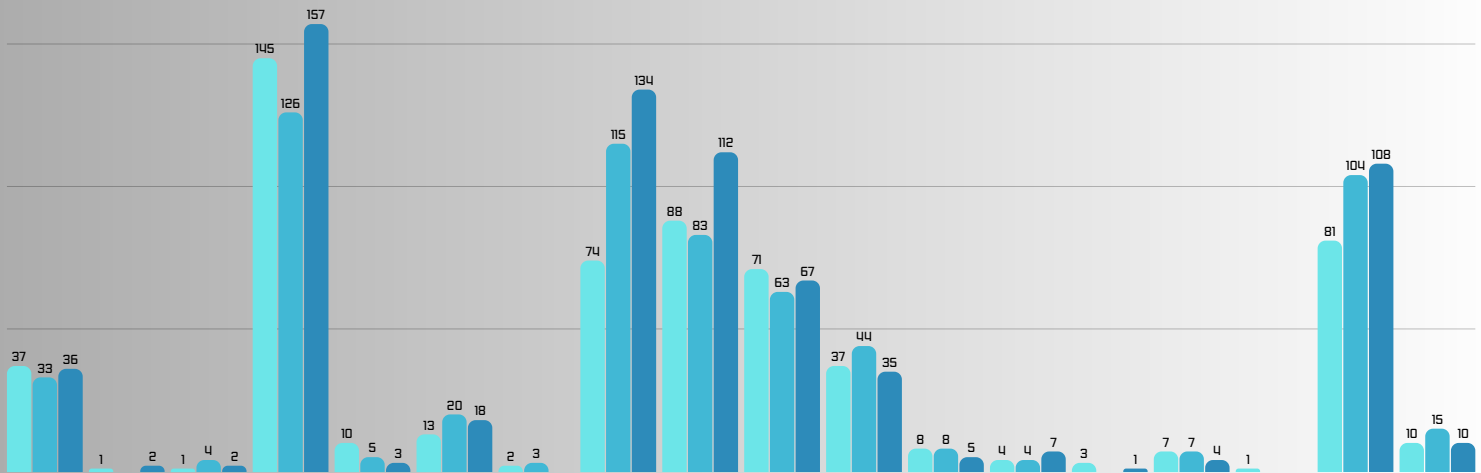
These investigations and prosecutions would not have been possible without the assistance and hard work of our fellow county agencies, specifically the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office - Oregon and the Lincoln County District Attorney's Office under District Attorney Jenna Wallace.

Although the Lincoln City Police Department is unable to provide follow-up to every case we post a release about, the seriousness of this case and its outcome is important to show the public that LCPD believes in making our community a safer place for all residents, especially children. LCPD encourages family members, parents, and friends to work with their children to monitor internet use and educate about the dangers of internet predators.

We have included booking photographs of both convicted child sex offenders in the interest of any other potential victims of their crimes possibly recognizing them and coming forward if they wish to do so.

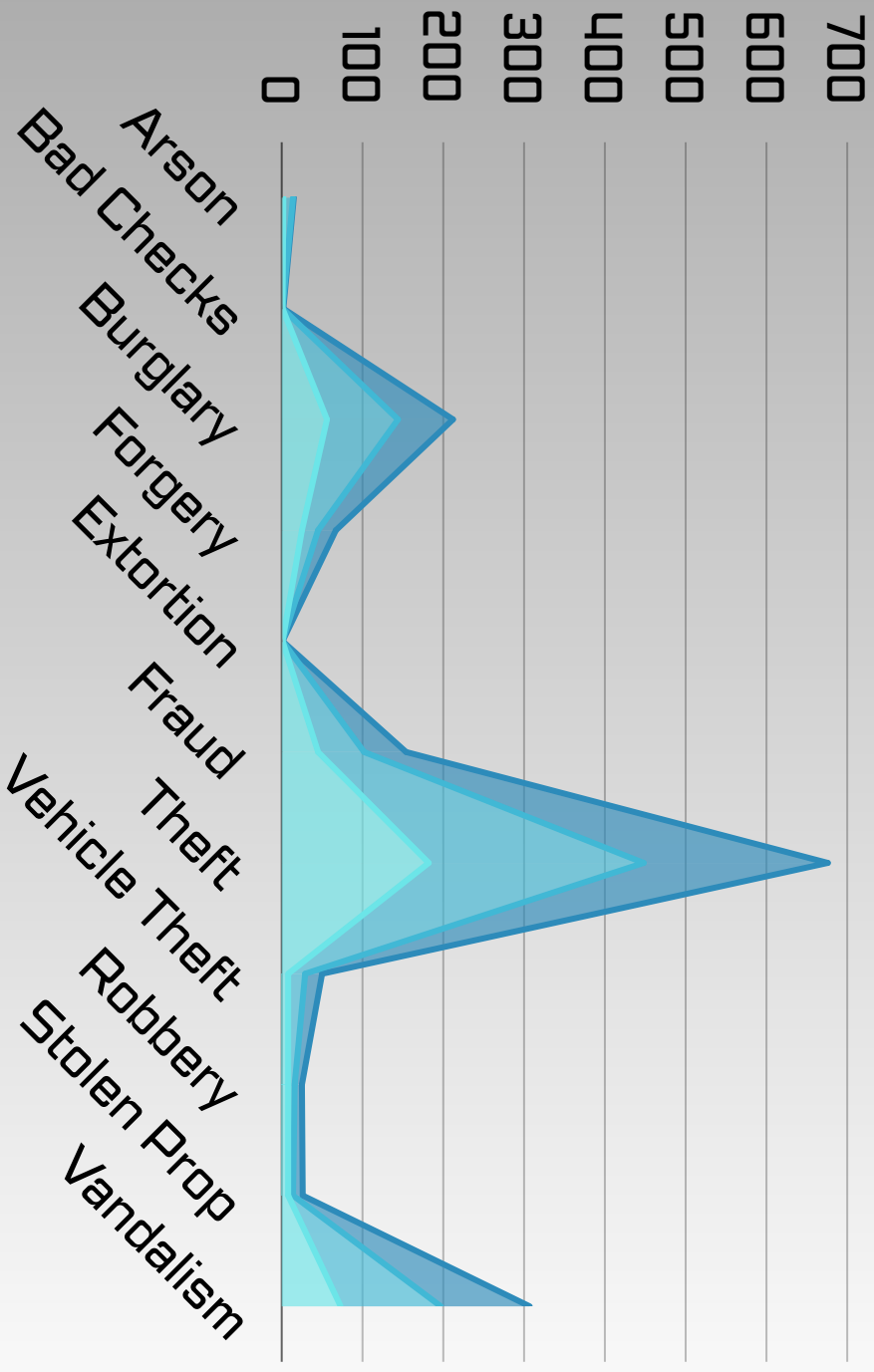

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

The School Resource Officer position is a sworn police officer who collaborates with the school administration on a daily basis. Typical duties of this SRO include traffic enforcement and traffic-related issues around the schools, threat assessments, volatility screenings, and providing security to requested events. The SRO also performs home visits, welfare checks, and meetings with various members of the school district and the public. He must maintain a wide knowledge of the laws and procedures surrounding minors. Our SRO also teaches classes addressing a variety of subjects, holds meetings with students, and works at various community events.

Logan Smith is a Senior Police Officer who has been with our department for the past 15 years. The last 7 of those years have been as the School Resource Officer in the Lincoln City Schools. Officer Smith has lived in Lincoln City for the past 29 years and is a graduate of Taft 7-12.



INVESTIGATION DIVISION

The Investigation Division includes one Detective Sergeant and two Major Crimes Detectives, and a newly added Narcotics Detective. The division is assigned the more complex criminal investigations requiring many hours of follow-up work. These cases include child abuse investigations, sex abuse investigations, human trafficking, major assaults, robberies, and homicides. In 2024, investigators were assigned **129** cases, clearing **126** of these and leaving **3** cases still under ongoing investigation.

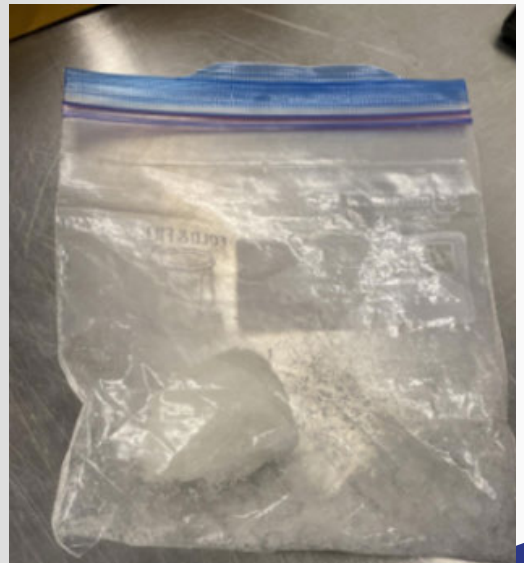
Investigators worked on several complex investigations in 2024, including sex abuse and child sex luring investigations, overdose death investigations, homicide investigations and multiple officer-involved shooting investigations within the county.

LCPD Investigators are part of the Lincoln County Major Crimes Team and work in collaboration with investigators from other agencies to investigate major crimes.

LCPD's Narcotics Detective began actively conducting investigations late in 2024 after spending several months in training.

During the course of a year, investigators attend specialized and updated training in child/sex abuse, homicide, human trafficking, and forensic data analysis investigation.

911 DISPATCH CENTER

The LCPD 911 Dispatch Center is incorporated within the Police Department. The Center services 911 calls for LCPD and North Lincoln Fire. In addition to 24/7 call-taking and non-emergency calls, dispatchers assist officers during their calls for service and handle various administrative duties to ensure the smooth operation of the department.

The ability of citizens to telephone quickly and easily for emergency service is critical. In addition to advanced two-way radio communications, the Lincoln City Police Department 911 Center utilizes a Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system designed to help public safety agencies in responding to requests for service. The CAD system improves productivity and effectiveness in the 911 Center by automating many time-consuming activities such as call taking, dispatching, communication, deployment, and unit status recording activities.

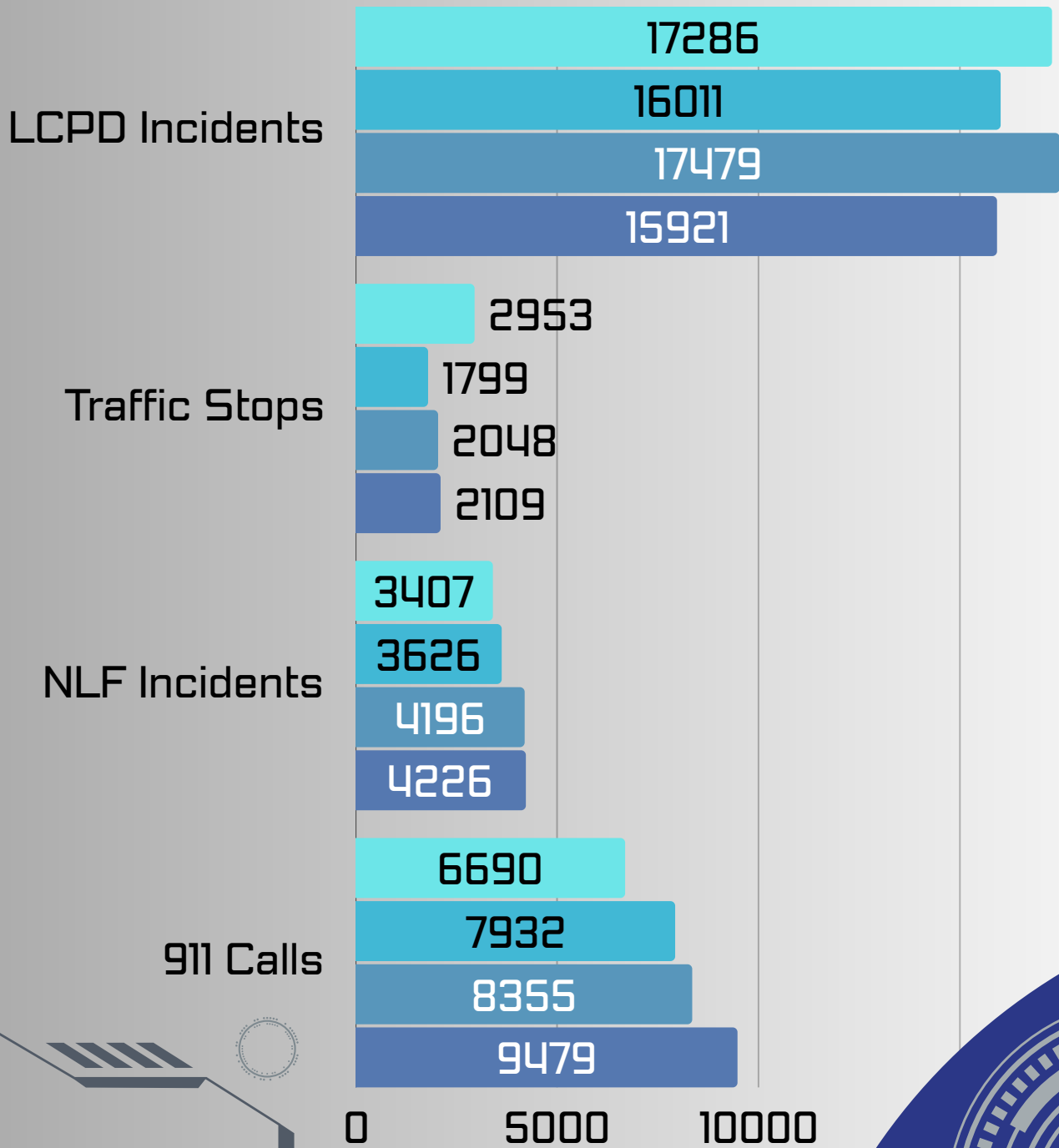

CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM

Chaplain Edwards was a former law enforcement officer in National City, CA. He later spent eight years working as a Postal Service investigator specializing in Narcotics/Child Exploitation. He retired from the US Coast Guard after spending many years as a chaplain to the Air Force, Marines, Navy, and finally the Coast Guard.

The Lincoln City Police Chaplaincy Department offered professional counseling and peer support for all members of the department, as well as city employees. In 2024, the Chaplaincy Department (Chaplain Andrew Edwards) completed the following:

- Responded to **5** call outs for DOAs, for approx. **8** hours
- Hosted **1** Crisis Management Debriefing for police officers and dispatch after an officer involved shooting
- Taught class on Police Chaplaincy and CISM to LC Citizen Academy
- Conducted **272** hours of visitation while on patrol with Lincoln City Police Officers
- Conducted approximately **50** hours of outreach to businesses and community members

K9 PROGRAM



The LCPD K9 Program was introduced in 2020 with K9 Nato, a German Shepherd. In 2022, the LCPD acquired a second police dog, K9 Nix, a Belgian Malinois. Their skills include tracking human scent, locating hidden evidence, and criminal apprehension.

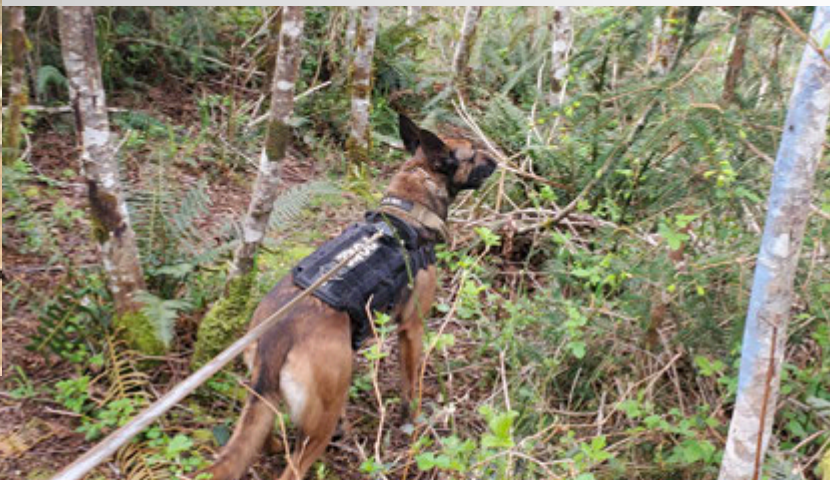
K9 Statistics

In 2024, the LCPD K9 team participated in **319** training hours away from the agency. They were deployed **28** times for various reasons, such as evidence recovery/searches, building searches, assisting other agencies. Of the 28 deployments, **4** resulted in apprehensions.

The law enforcement job market is highly competitive with strict requirements for candidates. In 2024, the LCPD the Recruitment Team participated in several recruitment fairs locally and around Oregon.

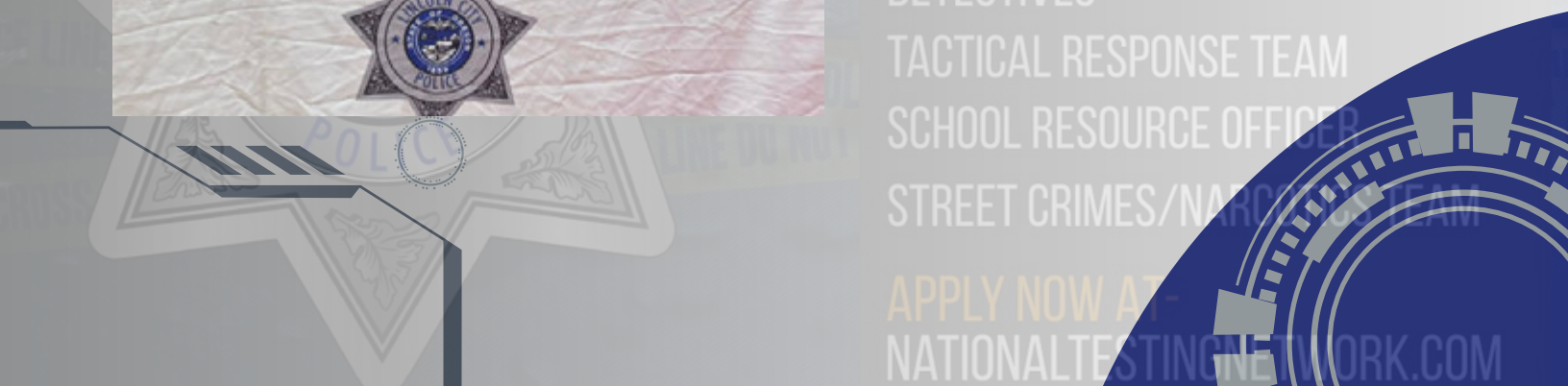

2024 CITIZEN ACADEMY

In 2024, we held our 7th annual Citizens Police Academy for the residents of North Lincoln County, and this year we had 10 community members graduate from the program. Every fall we proudly host our Citizens Police Academy, which provides community members with an in-depth opportunity to learn about our department and law enforcement in general. Our 13-week Academy covers information on local laws, police procedures, law enforcement theory, and investigations, as well as presentations from Dispatch, Evidence, Records, and other Lincoln County departments we utilize. Additionally, we provide our participants the opportunity for hands-on experiences learning about Use of Force tactics, Traffic Stops, Firearms, Fingerprinting, Active Attacker incidents, and interacting with our LCPD K9s.

We began our Academy in 2016 as a way to foster a partnership between our agency and the community, and the first-hand knowledge and experiences our participants receive creates an understanding about both law enforcement and our agency, to build that essential partnership. It also provides the opportunity for the participants to not only interact with the members of our agency, but to get to know the person inside the uniform on a more meaningful and personal level.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The Lincoln City Police Department strives to make meaningful connections with our community by engaging in open communication, transparent information releases, hosting events, and providing exceptional customer service to our guests and residents.
